






# Ezekiel The Glory of the LORD

Ezekiel, who grew up in a priestly family in Jerusalem and then was taken into captivity by the Babylonians in 597 B.C., recorded messages of judgment on Jerusalem and the nation of Judah because the people had not kept the covenant but fell into idolatry resulting in *the departure of the glory of the LORD* from the temple and also delivered messages of judgment on the nations and prophesied of a coming glorious new kingdom, with *a return of the glory of the LORD*, in order to show the exiles and the returnees that the glorious, powerful, and holy God is faithful to His covenant which should give them hope.
